### **Series History**

Longwood and Oklahoma are playing for the first-time ever in the sport of men's basketball. The Lancers, however, have played two members of the Big 12 Conference previously last season: at Kansas State (L 89-60, 12/5/05) and at Nebraska (L 80-65, 11/18/05). Longwood has also played against a Jeff Capel-coached team once before last season as well: at VCU (L 91-80, 12/22/05).

#### Truly, A David vs. Goliath

Longwood, with an enrollment of 4,400, has an average rating of 303 among the 336 Division I men's basketball-playing schools in the following six rating services: CBS Sportsline RPI, the CollegeRPI.com, Ken Pomeroy's College Basketball RPI, RealTimeRPI.com, RPIRatings.com, and the Sagarin Ratings. Oklahoma, with an enrollment of 30,447 (+26,047), has an average rating of 83 (+220).

#### Head Coach Mike Gillian

Mike Gillian was named the seventh men's basketball head coach at Longwood on May 2, 2003. Prior to his arrival, he had been an assistant coach for Jim Larranaga at George Mason for six years (1997-2003) after a year with Coach Larranaga at Bowling Green State (1996-97). Coach Gillian is now 23-88 overall at Longwood, including 7-16 this season after last year's record of 10-20 that tied for the seventh-best turnaround year in Division I.

## Last Time On The Floor (@Longwood 69 - High Point 64, Jan. 28)

Longwood outscored High Point 12-5 during the final 3:08 for a thrilling 69-64 come-from-behind victory in Willett Hall; stopping a six-game losing streak. The Lancers were led by Maurice Sumter with a double-double of 18 points and 10 rebounds, and it was his steal and layup that put the hosts ahead for good at 61-59 with 2:52 remaining. It was Sumter's second double-double of the season to go along with four assists, four steals, and two blocks. Clayton Morgan added 17 points and six rebounds for Longwood. LU shot 45% (29-65) from the field, including 13% (2-15) on three-point field goals, and 82% (9-11) at the free throw line, while taking great care of the basketball with a season-low seven turnovers. High Point, with an average RPI of 167, entered the contest with eight wins in its last nine games while standing second in the Big South Conference (6-1). The Panthers were led by Mike Jefferson with a game-high 21 points, while Arizona Reid also had a double-double of 18 points and a game-high 14 rebounds. Longwood forced 15 HPU turnovers that they converted into 20 points.

#### **Playing It Close**

Longwood has played better than its record would indicate as the Lancers have either been ahead or have been within two possessions (six points) of leading in five of their 16 losses with 5:00 remaining to play. Two of Longwood's losses have been by just two points, including one in overtime, while 10 of the other 14 losses have been away from Farmville this season.

### The Young But Veteran Leader

Maurice Sumter, who just turned 21 this past November 5 (he is actually younger than seven of his teammates), has been a consistent team leader all season as the fourth-year starter (110 games), and third-year team captain, is averaging a careerbest 16.3 points along with 5.6 rebounds while shooting 48% (144-300) from the field, including a team-best 40% (25-62) on three-point field goals, and 68% (61-90) at the free throw line. He adds 2.4 assists, 2.1 steals, and 1.3 blocks while also playing a team-best 36.1 minutes per game — the steals and blocks are team-highs as well. Sumter has reached double-figure scoring in 79 career contests, including 21 of 23 games this season, and 46 of his last 52 games overall. He earned Division I Independent Player of the Week honors for his recent 25-point effort at NJIT (1/10).

### **Impressive Career: 1,461 Points / 617 Rebounds**

Maurice Sumter has scored 1,461 points during his 110-game career at Longwood (13.3). He currently ranks fourth all-time in scoring for the Lancers, now 18 points from third-place (Joe Remar, 1979-83; 1,479). Sumter is also just the sixth player in the program's 31-year history to surpass 1,000 career points and 500 career rebounds. His 617 career rebounds (5.6) currently ranks fourth all-time at Longwood, now 31 rebounds from third-place (Ron Orr, 1979-83; 648). In addition, Sumter is tied for third all-time in career games, while ranking fourth in career field goals (574), fourth in career three-point field goals (106), ninth in career assists (250), fifth in career steals (191), and third in career blocks (118).

### **Sumter Garners Preseason Accolades**

Maurice Sumter (2005-06: 15.5 points, 5.4 rebounds) received numerous accolades from various preseason college basketball publications prior to this season. A starter in every game of his career, he averaged 19.2 points over the final 12 games of last season (50.3% FG). Sumter's preseason accolades included Division I Independent Player of the Year by <u>USA TODAY Sports Weekly College Basketball Preview</u>, Division I Independent's 'Best NBA Prospect', 'Best Defender', and All-Independent 1st-Team by *Lindy's College Basketball 2006-07*, and the All-Independent Team by *Street & Smith's College Basketball 2006-07 Yearbook*.

### **All-Tournament Team Honors**

Clayton Morgan earned All-Tournament Team honors at the <u>2006 Findlay Toyota/Las Vegas Classic</u>, averaging 18.0 points and 7.8 rebounds during the exempt tournament's four games, including 26.0 points and 8.5 rebounds in the two games while in Las Vegas (Dec. 22-23). He is averaging 12.8 points and a team-best 7.2 rebounds while playing 30.6 minutes per game. Morgan also received preseason recognition -- named Division I Independent's 'Best Rebounder' and All-Independent 2nd-Team by *Lindy's College Basketball 2006-07*. He averaged 12.3 points and 8.6 rebounds during 2005-06.

LONGWOOD VS OKLAHOMA

#### **Three-Point Record Is His**

Husein Pistoljevic is the new Longwood career three-point field goal record-holder (191), earning the record with a trio of three-pointers at High Point back on December 6. He is averaging 6.1 points and has a team-best 37 three-pointers (37-100, 37%), surpassing the former career leader DeVonne Johnson (1992-96, 167). Pistoljevic also holds the single-game record for three-point field goals, making nine against Virginia Union on February 5, 2004; also a Willett Hall record.

### Day In, Day Out

Like teammate Maurice Sumter, Lamar Barrett has started every game of his college career (84). He is averaging 6.3 points and a career-best 5.2 rebounds. A former Street & Smith's high school honorable mention All-American, Barrett has enjoyed two-plus solid seasons at Longwood while posting 657 points (7.8) and 391 rebounds (4.7). He was a Division I Independent All-Newcomer Team selection after his freshman campaign (9.7 points, 4.9 rebounds).

#### Ironman II

Brandon Giles is averaging a career-best 5.5 points and 3.5 assists while playing 29.6 minutes. He has started 38-straight games and currently ranks 11th in career assists (237), now 11 from 10th-place (Jason Outlaw, 248; 1994-98). Giles posted 16 assists (8.0) during the two games in Las Vegas, including a career-high nine against Charleston Southern (12/22). He averaged 35.6 minutes over the final 13 games last year, averaging 4.6 assists during this late stretch of the campaign.

### **Highlights At Eleven**

Kirk Williams is averaging career-bests of 9.7 points and 4.8 rebounds. Last year, as a freshman, he electrified crowds with his high-octane play that produced some spectacular dunks. In fact, Williams led the team a year ago with his 14 slams that included especially-memorable flushes against Liberty, #4 Villanova in Atlantic City's Boardwalk Hall, and at VCU. This year, he is shooting a team-best 52% (88-169) from the field, and already has a team-best 22 dunks as well. Williams missed two recent games with an ankle injury incurred at Yale (1/6), but returned against Savannah State, though is still not yet back at 100%.

### **Season-Ending Knee Injury**

Unfortunately, Dana Smith (2005-06: 9.6 points, 4.7 rebounds), will not return to action this season after a knee injury incurred in the third game of the season at Norfolk State November 15. He subsequently underwent arthroscopic surgery on November 30. Smith finished last season strong, averaging 13.4 points and 6.1 rebounds over the final nine games. He started the final 13 games of the year and finished second on the team in dunks (11).

### (Pre)Season-Ending Injury 2

Michael Jefferson (2005-06: 12.8 points) is also out of action this season with a foot injury suffered during pre-season conditioning in September. Ironically, he also missed 15 games last season due to ankle (both) and groin injuries. In addition, adding insult to injury, Jefferson endured off-season shoulder surgery as well. He is a 1,000-point career scorer at Longwood (1,078-14.8, 14th all-time).

#### Paging Dr. Rowe

Joel Rowe is an outstanding student at Longwood, compiling a remarkable 3.97 GPA while majoring in biology with a minor in psychology. This past summer, he served an undergraduate research fellowship at the MAYO Clinic in Jacksonville, Florida; assisting in the Neuropathology Lab. The Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship (S.U.R.F) program was composed of college students from schools such as Harvard, Cornell, Texas, Notre Dame, and Florida. Rowe presented 'A quantitative study of leukoaraiosis' to the Mayo faculty (both MD's and PhD's) at the conclusion of his fellowship. He is a two-time Division I Independent All-Academic Team honoree.

### Win, Win, Win

Kevin Swecker helped his Mount Saint Joseph high school team to a record of 38-1 last year. The third-team All-Baltimore Catholic League selection averaged 10.5 points and was one of five starters at MSJ who earned Division I scholarships. Mount Saint Joseph's 38 wins were a new Maryland high school record, and the program was ranked among the Top Ten in the final <u>USA TODAY</u> national high school rankings. He has played in all 23 games, averaging 3.6 points (13-16 FT, 81%) while making 13 three-pointers.

#### Like Father, Like Son

Billy Robinson Jr. is a second-generation college basketball player. His father, Billy Sr., played collegiately at Northern Illinois (1982-84). Billy Jr. has played in 18 games this year and is averaging 2.8 points (11-25 3FG, 44%) and 1.4 rebounds. Robinson Jr. averaged 12.1 points, 10.2 rebounds, and 3.0 blocks as a senior at Hammond (Md.) High School.

#### Basketball's His Game But Football's In His Blood

Danny Wilson is one of nine children in his family, including six brothers and two sisters. Three older brothers played or play Division I football: Amos Jr. at New Mexico and Everett at North Carolina A&T, while Jacob currently plays at Western Carolina. A younger brother, C.J., currently plays at East Carolina. Amos Jr. is now playing professionally with the Johnstown (Pa.) RiverHawks of the American Indoor Football League (AIFL). A junior transfer, Wilson is looking to make his mark in college basketball and has played in 15 games this year with averages of 1.4 points (8-22 FG) and 1.7 rebounds.

#### **Walk-On Earns PT**

E.J. Dawson joined the program as a walk-on this year but has earned playing time at point guard in all 23 games. He averaged 16.1 points at Mount Vernon High School last year while being named the National District player of the year, All-Region, and All-Met by The Washington Post.

### Las Vegas Classic Déjà vu

Longwood participated in the exempt four-game 2006 Findlay Toyota/Las Vegas Classic December 17-23 for the second time in three years. The first two games of the event were on the road at New Mexico (Dec. 17, L 79-60), and at Southern California (Dec. 19, L 83-53); before playing two games in Las Vegas at the Orleans Arena against Charleston Southern (Dec. 22, W 73-67) and against Kennesaw State (Dec. 23, W 87-85 OT). The Lancers (2-2) finished fifth among eight teams, behind high-profile schools Kansas State (4-0), UNM (3-1), USC (3-1), and nationally-ranked Wichita State (2-2), respectively.

### The Three-Point Stat

Longwood has made at least one three-point field goal in 137 consecutive games that date back to Nov. 26, 2002 (at Lenoir-Rhyne, W 72-68). The streak includes a high of 13 three-pointers against Virginia Union (Feb. 5, 2004).

#### **Veteran Line-Up**

Longwood returned all five starters among 10 returning lettermen from a year ago, including the top six scorers overall who combined for 79 percent (1,740 of 2,194 points) of the team's offense. Additionally, seven players returned who played at least 18 minutes per game, averaging 26.6 minutes among them. Each of the seven averaged at least 7.0 points per game, including three double-figure scorers. The starters include Maurice Sumter, Clayton Morgan, Lamar Barrett, Brandon Giles, and Dana Smith. Unfortunately, as already mentioned, Smith will not return to action this season after a knee injury incurred in the third game of the season at Norfolk State November 15.

### **Experienced Bench Depth**

The other five returning lettermen from last season include Michael Jefferson, Husein Pistoljevic, and Kirk Williams along with a pair of senior walk-on team members in Darren Holmes and Joel Rowe. Unfortunately, as already mentioned, Jefferson will not play this season after a foot injury suffered during pre-season conditioning in September.

### **Senior Captains**

Maurice Sumter and Husein Pistoljevic are serving as team captains this year, as named by Coach Gillian during preseason. Both seniors, Sumter is a captain for the third-straight year while Pistoljevic is a captain for the second consecutive season.

### First-Time Opponents

Longwood opened its 2006-07 campaign with a 71-49 home victory past visiting Virginia-Wise in Willett Hall. Senior Maurice Sumter led the Lancers (1-0) with a game-high 19 points while classmate Clayton Morgan added a double-double of 14 points and a game-high 13 rebounds. The NAIA Highland Cavaliers (0-2) were led by Zydrunas Rackauskas and Seth Gibson with 11 points each

Longwood battled through a sluggish first half to lead 31-24 at the intermission behind 14 first-half points from Sumter. The 6-5 guard-forward scored five points over the final 2:13 of the period to spark a 10-3 run to close the opening 20 minutes. Freshman Kevin Swecker contributed the other five points, including a three-pointer. The Lancers shot 41% (12-29) from the floor in the first half, and were just 5-10 at the free throw line while committing 10 turnovers in a ragged opening 20 minutes.

Longwood took control of the contest in the second half, taking a 42-32 lead at 15:10 as sophomore Kirk Williams scored eight quick points, including a monstrous dunk on the backside lob pass from junior Brandon Giles who finished with five assists. The Lancers extended the lead to 20 points at 58-38 with 9:10 remaining as Morgan tallied 10 points, including an old-fashioned three-point play inside during the 16-6 run. Virginia-Wise did manage to close to within 60-46 at 4:56, but the hosts secured the decisive triumph by outscoring the visitors 11-3 over the final 3:47 -- a closing run started with a three-pointer from Sumter.

Sumter finished with a game-high 19 points, adding a game-high six assists as well along with five rebounds and five steals for Longwood. Morgan earned his seventh career double-double with 14 points and a game-high 13 rebounds, while Williams finished with 10 points off the bench for the Lancers. LU shot 47% (26-55) from the field, including 54% (14-24) after the break, 21% (3-14) on three-point field goals, and 70% (16-23) at the free throw line. The Lancers took a 40-26 advantage in rebounds, and forced 19 turnovers.

Rackauskas and Gibson each finished with 11 points to lead Virginia-Wise. The Highland Cavaliers shot 36% (16-45) from the field, including 12% (2-17) on three-pointers, and 68% (15-22) at the line.

### Game 2, November 13, 2006 VCU 75 - Longwood 63 Farmville, Virginia

Longwood dropped a hard-fought 75-63 decision to visiting VCU in Willett Hall; the largest crowd to ever witness a college basketball game at Longwood with a full-capacity crowd of 2,522 in Farmville. The Rams (1-0) won their opening game under the direction of first-year head coach Anthony Grant, led by Eric Maynor with a team-high 15 points. Senior Maurice Sumter led the Lancers (1-1) with a game-high 22 points.

Longwood trailed 38-24 at halftime, and VCU took its largest lead of the night at 52-31 with 14:30 remaining on a lay-up from Wil Fameni. The Lancers, however, refused to quit and battled back to within 58-44 at 8:21 with a 13-6 run that included an offensive rebound and dunk by Sumter. Longwood continued its momentum and closed to within 69-58 with 2:31 left as senior Clayton Morgan scored eight quick points. Sumter followed with five-straight points for the Lancers who closed to within 73-63 but only 36-seconds remained and Maynor made two free throws for VCU at 0:26 to provide for the final margin.

VCU opened the contest with a 17-6 run just 6:05 into the game as Maynor (4), B.A. Walker (4), and Michael Anderson (6) combined for 14 quick points. The Rams extended the margin to 25-9 at 10:58 as Jamal Shuler tallied five points, including a three-pointer. Longwood managed to reduce the deficit to 27-17 with 7:10 left before the intermission as freshman Kevin Swecker came off the bench to make back-to-back three-point field goals. Walker, however, answered with consecutive three-pointers of his own to push the Rams back ahead 35-19 at 3:31 as the visitors led by 14 points (38-24) at the break.

Sumter finished with a game-high 22 points (9-13 FG, 2-3 3FG), 2-3 FT), adding five rebounds, three assists, and three blocks for Longwood. Morgan added 14 points and five rebounds, while junior Lamar Barrett added his second career double-double with 10 points and a game-high 10 rebounds for the Lancers. Swecker contributed a career-high nine points for the hosts. LU shot 39% (24-61) from the field, including 36% (5-14) on three-point field goals, and 63% (10-16) at the free throw line. The Lancers and Rams tied in rebounding at 39-39, and hosts finished with nine blocks.

Maynor finished with 15 points to lead five double-figure scorers for VCU, adding a gamehigh six assists. Other scoring by the visitors included Anderson (13), Fameni (12), Walker (10), and Shuler (10). Anderson also had seven rebounds, and Walker had five steals. The Rams shot 48% (28-59) from the field, including 25% (4-16) on three-pointers, and 54% (15-28) at the line while making Coach Grant a winner in his collegiate head coaching debut.

### Game 3, November 15, 2006 Longwood 65 - Norfolk State 54 Norfolk, Virginia

Longwood took a 65-54 road victory at Norfolk State in Norfolk. The Lancers (2-1) outscored the host Spartans 16-5 over the final 8:48, and were led by sophomore Kirk Williams with a game-high 16 points off the bench while Tony Murphy led NSU (0-2) with 12 points.

Longwood trailed 31-26 at the intermission before taking control of the contest about midway through the second half and pulling away at the end. The Lancers closed to within 33-31 just 2:24 after the break but Norfolk State quickly took its largest lead of the game at 44-37 with 12:53 remaining. Longwood, however, stormed back with a 15-5 run that began and ended with three-point field goals by freshman Kevin Swecker to put the visitors in front for good, 52-49, at 8:48. The run included consecutive offensive rebound-dunks by Williams who also tallied six quick points. The Lancers continued to dominate the action down the stretch with their game-ending 13-5 run to provide for the final comfortable margin of victory.

Longwood had opened the game with the first points as Sumter connected on a jumper on the first possession just 17-seconds into contest. Norfolk State took advantage of a 14-2 run to lead 14-8 at 11:26. The Lancers battled back to lead 19-18 with just 5:55 left in the half as senior Husein Pistoljevic made a three-pointer and Williams added the first of his three dunks in the game. The Spartans rallied back to lead 28-21 at 1:43 before Pistoljevic nailed another trey and added 2-3 free throws when fouled on another three-point attempt. A steal and lay-up by Murphy made it a five-point margin for the hosts at halftime.

Williams finished with 16 points and eight rebounds to lead Longwood, making 8-9 shots from the floor while playing just 24 minutes. Sumter added 14 points and seven rebounds, adding two blocks as well, while Pistoljevic had 10 points off the bench – making 2-3 three-pointers. Giles finished with eight points, four assists, and three steals while Swecker also had eight points – making 2-3 three-pointes as well. Senior Clayton Morgan grabbed a game-high 10 rebounds for the Lancers, adding seven points to the attack. LU shot 44% (24-54) from the field, including 57% (13-23) in the second half, 25% (4-16) on three-pointers, and 57% (13-23) at the free throw line.

Murphy had 12 points to lead Norfolk State but made just 5-18 shots, while Calvin Brown contributed 11 points and eight rebounds. NSU shot 39% (21-54) from the field, including 13% (2-16) on three-pointers, and 46% (10-22) at the line. The Spartans committed 19 turnovers that led to 18 Longwood points.

### Game 4, November 17, 2006 George Washington 74 - Longwood 60 Washington, D.C.

Longwood led 35-27 at halftime before host and defending Atlantic 10 regular season champion George Washington rallied for a 74-60 victory at the Smith Center in Washington, D.C.. The Lancers (2-2) led the entire first half and nearly half of the second half, led by senior Maurice Sumter with a double-double of 19 points and a game-high 10 rebounds. The unbeaten Colonials (3-0) were led by Maureece Rice with a career-high 23 points and Rob Diggs with a double-double of 22 points and 10 rebounds, also career-highs.

Longwood jumped ahead early and led 16-9 at 12:46 on a three-pointer from junior Brandon Giles. The Colonials, however, answered with five-straight points to close to within 16-14 at 11:44 only to see the visitors run-off eight unanswered points to lead 24-14 with 9:41 left in the first half as senior Clayton Morgan finished the run with three-pointer. Sumter gave Longwood its largest lead of the game at 34-22 with just 2:59 left before halftime as he tallied 17 first-half points. George Washington managed to narrow the margin to eight points at the intermission.

Longwood extended its advantage early in the second half, leading by double-digits again at 39-28 with 18:37 on the clock after an offensive rebound follow dunk by sophomore Kirk Williams. The Colonials came charging back with six-straight points, though the Lancers still led 41-36 at 14:39 on a free throw by Morgan. GW finally caught the visitors at 41-41 with 12:11 remaining on a tip-in basket as Longwood had the lead for the first 27:48 of the contest. George Washington took its first lead at 11:38 on a three-pointer by Rice that began a 22-4 run to secure the hard-fought home win. The Lancers refused to quit, however, and battled back to within 70-58 with just 1:19 left as Williams scored eight points. GW head coach Karl Hobbs emptied his bench with just 10-seconds on the clock.

Sumter finished with 19 points and a game-high 10 rebounds for his sixth career double-double to lead Longwood, adding five steals and two blocks in 38 minutes. Morgan had 14 points, four rebounds, and three assists, while Williams contributed 12 points – all scored in the second half for the Lancers. LU shot 41% (21-51) from the field, including 54% (13-24) in the first half, 29% (5-17) on three-point field goals (0-7, second half), and 65% (13-20) at the free throw line. Longwood played without Dana Smith, a junior starting guard-forward, who missed the contest with a knee injury.

Rice scored a game-high 23 points, also a career-high, to lead George Washington, while Diggs added 22 points and a game-high 10 rebounds for his own double-double – also career-high totals. Carl Elliott was limited to nine points after entering the contest with an average of 27.0. GW shot 39% (25-64) from the field, including 22% (4-18) on three-pointers, and 77% (20-26) at the line.

It was Longwood's first-ever game against George Washington, a program that finished 27-3 a year ago while winning the A-10 regular season title (16-0) and advancing to the second-round of the NCAA Tournament. The Colonials have won 67 games (67-23) over the past three seasons and had won their first two games this year by an average margin of 29 points in victories at Boston University and at home against Dartmouth. The contest was also witnessed by veteran Boston Globe sportswriter Bob Ryan who spoke briefly with Lancer head coach Mike Gillian afterwards outside the team lockerroom.

### Game 5, November 20, 2006 Richmond 83 - Longwood 72 Richmond, Virginia

Longwood staged a furious second-half comeback attempt that fell short while dropping a disappointing 83-72 road decision at the University of Richmond at the Robins Center. The Lancers (2-3) rallied from a 20-point deficit with 13:23 remaining to within five points at 73-68 with 3:50 left but could get no closer. Senior Maurice Sumter led the visitors with a game-high 22 points, while Dan Geriot led the Spiders (3-0) with 19 points.

Richmond led 44-31 at halftime after shooting a torrid 74% (17-23) from the field, including an incredible 80% (8-10) on three-point field goals. Ryan Butler was perfect in 18 minutes, making 5-5 field goals, including 3-3 on three-pointers, and 1-1 at the free throw line for 14 first-half points. David Gonzalvez added 12 points off the bench, making 5-6 shots from the floor. The Spiders led by as many as 16 points in the opening period, though Longwood was able to stay in the game with 15-19 free throws as Sumter (4-4) scored 12 points and senior Clayton Morgan (4-5) added 10 points.

The Spiders quickly added two more threepointers to start the second half and led 54-34 at 17:41. A lay-up by Morgan cut the margin to 56-41 with 16:00 remaining but Richmond was able to push the margin back to 20 points at 61-41 with 13:23 left to play. Longwood refused to quit, however, and proceeded to outscore the hosts 27-12 over the next 9:33 to close to within 73-68 at 3:50. Sumter scored eight points during the run, including an old-fashioned three-point play inside and a lay-up to close the late spurt. Sophomore Kirk Williams added six points, including a fast-break dunk, before fouling out with 7:47 on the clock, and junior Brandon Giles had five points with a long three-pointer as well. The hosts led 76-70 with just under three minutes remaining when a Lancer three-point attempt was halfway down before coming back out, a shot that would have made it a three-point game. Unfortunately, it did not go in and Richmond converted 7-8 free throws over the final 2:32 to secure its home victory.

Sumter finished with a game-high 22 points to lead Longwood, including 5-5 at the free throw line while playing 39 minutes. Morgan scored a season-high 17 points, adding six rebounds and three steals, while Giles and Williams each contributed 10 points for the Lancers. LU shot 50% (24-48) from the field, including 55% (16-29) in the second half, 33% (5-15) on three-pointers, and 79% (19-24) at the line.

Geriot led Richmond with his team-high 19 points, including 15 points in the second half. Others in double-figure scoring for the Spiders were Butler (16 points), David Brewster (13 points), Gonzalvez (12 points), and Peter Thomas (12 points). UR shot 72% (28-39) from the field, including 69% (11-16) on three-pointers, and 64% (16-25) at the line.

### Game 6, November 25, 2006 Longwood 88 - Shenandoah 60 Farmville, Virginia

Longwood took an 88-60 home victory past visiting Shenandoah in Willett Hall. Senior Husein Pistoljevic led the Lancers (3-3) with both a game-high and season-high 21 points off the bench while sophomore Kirk Williams added his first career double-double with 12 points and a game-high 12 rebounds. The Division III Hornets (1-1) were led by Jeremiah Lawrence with 19 points.

Longwood broke open a close game early in the second half with a decisive 24-1 run that turned a 42-41 deficit at 18:11 into a commanding 65-43 advantage at 8:19. The offensive explosion included eight points from Williams and six points from senior Maurice Sumter. Pistolievic capped the scoring barrage with the first of his six second-half three-point field goals as he made 6-10 three-pointers over the final 8:19. The Lancers took their largest lead of the contest at 32 points (88-56) with 1:28 remaining on Pistoljevic's final three-pointer as the fourthyear player finished with 18 second-half points. Longwood shot 53% (17-32) from the field, including 55% (6-11) on three-pointers, over the final 20 minutes.

Longwood had led 40-36 at halftime as the visitors kept pounding the ball inside for 28 points in the paint while also out-rebounding the hosts 24-19. Shenandoah's three inside players combined for 26 of the team's 36 first-half points, including nine from Lawrence. The Lancers took their largest lead of the opening half at 35-26 with 4:00 left before the break on a pair of free throws from senior Clayton Morgan. Sumter and junior Lamar Barrett each scored eight first-half points while freshman Kevin Swecker came off the bench to contribute seven points, including a three-pointer. The Hornets had opened the game with the first three points (3-0, 19:10) for their largest lead of the entire contest.

Pistoljevic finished with a game-high, and season-high of 21 points, making 7-11 from threepoint territory in 16 minutes for Longwood. Sumter finished with 15 points (7-10 FG), adding three blocks, while Williams earned his first career double-double with 12 points and a gamehigh 12 rebounds, also contributing career-highs of four assists, three blocks, and two steals for the Lancers. Barrett had 10 points and a game-high six assists, and Morgan totaled nine points and eight rebounds. LU shot 50% (33-66) from the field, including a season-high 48% (12-25) on three-point field goals, and 67% (10-15) at the free throw line. The Lancers took a 46-40 advantage in rebounds, and also forced 26 turnovers -converting to 26 points.

Lawrence finished with 19 points to lead Shenandoah, while Onyie Onunaku added 12 points and eight rebounds. The Hornets shot 36% (24-66) from the field, including 17% (2-12) on three-pointers, and 50% (10-20) at the line.

### Game 7, November 28, 2006 N.C. A&T 71 - Longwood 59 Greensboro, North Carolina

Longwood dropped a 71-59 road decision at North Carolina A&T in Greensboro, North Carolina. The visiting Lancers (3-4) were led by senior Maurice Sumter with a game-high 19 points, while the host Aggies (2-4) were led by Glenn Nelson with 14 points.

Longwood fell behind 5-1 just 1:58 into the game before a 7-2 run gave the Lancers their only lead of the night at 8-7 with 15:44 left in the opening half on a three-point field goal from junior Brandon Giles. North Carolina A&T went back in front, though only led 13-12 at 11:42 after a lay-in from Sumter. The Aggies took advantage of a 19-10 run to take their largest lead of the first half at 32-22 with 4:58 left before the break. A pair of free throws from senior Clayton Morgan made it 34-29 at 1:27 but the hosts scored the final three points of the period to lead 37-29 at the intermission.

Longwood trailed 42-31 with 15:52 remaining before battling back into the contest, closing to within 47-45 at 11:10 on a pair of free throws by Giles to cap a 14-5 run. Sumter scored five points during the run, including a three-pointer. It remained close the rest of the way as the Lancers were still within two points at 55-53 with 6:29 left on two more free throws from Giles. NCAT, however, responded with backto-back three-pointers to lead 61-53 at 4:23 before Sumter scored four unanswered points to pull the visitors back within 61-57 with 3:15 on the clock. It appeared that the Lancers had a defensive stop on a block/jump ball situation but it was not called and the ball bounced to an Aggie player under the basket for the lay-up at 2:38 that began a game-ending 10-2 run for the final 12-point margin - also the largest lead of the contest.

Sumter finished with a game-high 19 points, adding five rebounds while playing the entire 40 minutes to lead Longwood. Morgan just missed a double-double with his nine points and game-high 10 rebounds for the Lancers while Giles and junior Lamar Barrett each contributed seven points. LU shot just 35% (19-55) from the field, including 24% (6-25) on three-pointers, and 83% (15-18) at the free throw line – committing 24 turnovers that were converted into 25 points.

Nelson came off the bench to score 14 points for North Carolina A&T, while Austin Ewing and Jason Wills each added 13 points. The Aggies shot 50% (27-54) from the field, including 40% (6-15) on three-pointers, and 55% (11-20) at the line. NCAT committed 22 turnovers, though Longwood only converted into 15 points.

### Game 8, December 1, 2006 Navy 61 - Longwood 59 OT Farmville, Virginia

Longwood dropped a heartbreaking 61-59 overtime thriller to visiting Navy in Willett Hall. The Midshipmen (6-2) rallied from a seven-point deficit with 3:34 left in regulation before scoring the first nine points in overtime and then held on for the hard-fought road win. The tough-luck Lancers (3-5) were led by senior Clayton Morgan with a game-high 21 points, while junior Greg Sprink led Navy with 16 points.

Longwood led 46-39 with 3:34 remaining after an old-fashioned three-point play inside from Morgan. Navy, though, scored seven unanswered points to tie it at 46-46 with 1:40 on the clock as Sprink made a three-point field goal (3:13), followed by a lay-up (2:47), and two free throws by junior Corey Johnson (1:40). Morgan added two free throws at 1:03 (48-46), but Johnson made two more free throws at 0:53 (48-48). Senior Maurice Sumter scored inside on a lay-up at 0:36 (50-48), only to have Johnson make a jumper in the lane to tie it again at 50-50 (0:22). The Lancers had an opportunity to win in regulation but missed a 15-foot jumper just ahead of the final buzzer.

In OT, the Midshipmen got a three-pointer from sophomore Adam Teague at 4:35 to lead 53-50, followed quickly by a steal and lay-up by classmate Kaleo Kina with 4:20 left. Navy added another jumper from Sprink (3:29), and a lay-up by Johnson to lead 59-50 at 2:31. Longwood refused to quit, however, and battled back to within 60-57 on a three-pointer from Sumter with 44-seconds remaining. The Lancers had a potential gametying three-point attempt with 12-seconds left that was in-and-out, and missed a putback as well before Sprink secured the outcome with 1-2 free throws at 0:09 for a four-point cushion (61-57). Morgan added a lay-up at the buzzer for the final narrow two-point margin of defeat.

Morgan finished with a game-high and season-high of 21 points (9-9 FT), adding nine rebounds to lead Longwood. Sumter added an outstanding all-around effort of 18 points (8-14 FG) and nine rebounds, along with game-highs and career-highs of seven assists and six steals in 44 minutes for the Lancers. Sophomore Kirk Williams contributed 12 points, including his first career three-pointer late in the game (2:05, ot), while junior Lamar Barrett grabbed a game-high and career-high 11 rebounds to go with his five points. LU shot 37% (22-60) from the field, including just 18% (3-17) on three-pointers, and 67% (12-18) at the free throw line. The hosts out-rebounded the visitors 45-37.

Sprink scored 16 points to lead Navy, adding nine rebounds, while Johnson had 12 points and Kina totaled 11 points. The Midshipmen shot 35% (20-57) from the field, including 33% (9-27) on three-pointers, and 63% (12-19) at the line. The closely-played contest witnessed seven lead-changes, and eight ties throughout as Longwood's largest lead was seven points (18-11, 5:54 - 1st) with Navy's in the extra period at nine points (59-50, 2:31).

### Game 9, December 4, 2006 American 60 - Longwood 49 Washington, D.C.

Longwood dropped a 60-49 road decision at Patriot League member American University in Washington, D.C.. The Lancers (3-6) rallied from a 16-point halftime deficit to within five points with 6:06 remaining but could get no closer, led by senior Maurice Sumter with a game-high 15 points. The host Eagles (6-2) were led by Brayden Billbe and Andre Ingram with 13 points each.

Longwood fell behind 4-0 just 25-seconds into the contest as American jumped out to a 15-2 advantage at 13:14 as Ingram scored five early points. Sumter's jumper at 12:03 made it 15-6 before Ingram made a three-point field goal to help the Eagles to a 20-6 lead with 10:49 left in the first half. The Lancers closed to within 22-14 at 6:56 on a lay-up from sophomore Kirk Williams. American, however, outscored Longwood 13-5 the remainder of the period to lead 35-19 at the intermission. The Eagles shot 62% (16-26) from the field in the first half, compared to 24% (8-34) by the visiting Lancers.

American took its largest lead at 41-23 with 16:43 left to play, and still led 47-31 at 13:43. Longwood used a 7-1 run to close to within 48-38 with 9:11 remaining as Williams scored six quick points, including a dunk off the backside lob-pass. The Lancers continued with their momentum and was within 50-45 at 6:06, capping a 22-9 run after falling behind by 18 points. It was 54-48 after another jumper from Sumter with 4:19 on the clock, but unfortunately, the Eagles would outscore the visitors 6-1 over the final 3:39 for their homecourt victory.

Sumter finished with a game-high 15 points to lead Longwood, while Williams added 10 points. Junior Lamar Barrett grabbed a game-high and career-high 14 rebounds to go along with his eight points, while senior Clayton Morgan added six points and nine rebounds. LU shot 33% (20-60) from the field, including just 10% (2-20) on three-point field goals, and 58% (7-12) at the free throw line. Longwood did out-rebound American 43-33, but committed 18 turnovers that the Eagles converted into 20 points.

Billbe and Ingram each scored 13 points to lead American, while Derrick Mercer added 12 points as the trio combined to shoot 15-28 from the field for the Eagles. AU shot 48% (25-52) from the field as a team, including 24% (4-17) on three-pointers, and 43% (6-14) at the line.

### Game 10, December 6, 2006 High Point 59 - Longwood 57 High Point, North Carolina

Longwood dropped a difficult 59-57 road decision at High Point University in North Carolina. The host Panthers (6-3) closed the game with a 15-3 run over the final 7:36 to erase a 10-point deficit as Arizona Reid (16 points) converted a decisive three-point play inside with just 5.5-seconds remaining for the come-from-behind win. Senior Maurice Sumter led the visiting hard-luck Lancers (3-7) with a game-high 18 points.

Longwood had taken a 54-44 lead with 8:01 remaining a three-point field goal from senior Husein Pistoljevic. It was Pistoljevic's third three-pointer of the contest as he became the school's all-time leader in three-point field goals with 169, surpassing DeVonne Johnson (1992-96, 167). At that point, everything began going wrong for the Lancers who did not score another field goal the remainder of the game. The visitors were 0-9 from the field, including 0-2 on three-pointers, and 3-6 at the free throw line with three turnovers as High Point rallied for the victory behind seven late points from Reid, including the game-winning and old-fashioned three-point play -- the only lead of the second half for HPU.

Longwood fell behind early for the secondstraight contest, trailing 9-0 at 15:47 of the first half. The Lancers finally got on the scoreboard at 15:28 on a three-pointer by Pistoljevic, and battled back to lead 13-11 on a jumper from Sumter at 12:24 who scored eight quick points. The two teams traded baskets for several minutes with the opening 20 minutes featuring nine lead-changes and seven ties. Longwood took its largest lead of the half at 27-22 with 4:36 left before the break on a lay-up from junior Brandon Giles, and the Lancers led 31-28 at the intermission on a buzzerbeating lay-up by senior Clayton Morgan. Sumter's basket at 14:54 gave Longwood its biggest lead of the game at 41-30, and the Lancers seemed in control until things went south over the final eight minutes.

Sumter finished with a game-high 18 points (8-13 FG), adding four rebounds, three assists, and two steals to lead Longwood while moving into seventh on the career scoring list (1,268). Sophomore Kirk Williams added 12 points, eight rebounds, and three assists off the bench for the Lancers, while Morgan had 10 points and seven rebounds. Pistoljevic finished with nine points (3-6 3FG), including the career three-point field goal record (169). LU shot 44% (22-50) from the field, including 52% (13-25) in the first half, 31% (4-13) on three-pointers, and 56% (9-16) at the line. The Lancers did out-rebound the Panthers 38-35.

Reid finished with a double-double of 16 points and 10 rebounds to lead High Point which also got 16 points from Mike Jefferson, including a big three-pointer at 1:38 to pull the hosts to within 57-56. Jerald Minnis added 10 points and seven rebounds for the Panthers. HPU shot 36% (21-59) from the field, including 25% (5-20) on three-pointers, and 57% (12-21) at the line.

### Game 11, December 9, 2006 Liberty 89 - Longwood 61 Lynchburg, Virginia

Longwood dropped an 89-61 road decision at Liberty University in Lynchburg. Junior Brandon Giles led the visiting Lancers (3-8) with a season-high 13 points, while the host Flames (6-1) were led by Larry Blair with a game-high 18 points.

Longwood fell behind 15-5 just 5:02 into the contest as the Flames scored three quick three-point field goals. The hosts increased the advantage to 33-13 at 5:32 before the Lancers battled back to within 33-24 with 11 unanswered points and 2:21 left until halftime. Giles scored five points during the quick outburst but Liberty scored the final four points of the period and led comfortably (39-26) at the intermission. Longwood closed to within 10 points early in the second half at 39-29 with 17:37 remaining but could get no closer as the Flames shot 59% (19-32) from the field after the break, including 60% (6-10) on three-pointers as their largest lead of the game was 33 points (89-56, 1:49).

Giles scored a season-high 13 points, including 7-8 free throws, adding five rebounds and four assists to lead Longwood. Sophomore Kirk Williams added 12 points (6-10 FG) and five rebounds off the bench, and senior Husein Pistoljevic contributed 11 points with a trio of three-pointers for the Lancers. Longwood shot 35% (20-57) from the field, including 32% (6-19) on three-pointers, and 79% (15-19) at the line. Senior Maurice Sumter had his streak of 26 consecutive double-figure scoring games ended as he finished with just seven points after collecting three fouls in the first 11:06 and never really got untracked.

Blair finished with 18 points to lead six double-figure scorers for Liberty, followed by Alex McLean (17), Anthony Smith (15), Rell Porter (10), B.J. Jenkins (10), and Tyler Baker (10). The Flames shot 49% (30-61) from the field, including 50% (11-22) on three-pointers, and 86% (18-21) at the line.

Overall, the contest witnessed a combined 43 personal fouls that were whistled -- resulting in a combined 40 free throw attempts.

### Game 12, December 17, 2006 New Mexico 79 - Longwood 60 Albuquerque, New Mexico

Longwood dropped a 79-60 road decision at the University of New Mexico in the first-round of the 2006 Findlay Toyota/Las Vegas Classic at The Pit in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The Lancers (3-9) had a 33-32 lead at halftime, and were led by senior Maurice Sumter with a teamhigh 16 points. The host Lobos (7-2) were led by junior transfer J.R. Giddens (Kansas) with a game-high 25 points, including 14 in the decisive second half.

Longwood allowed New Mexico to score the first five points of the contest before a 12-2 run gave the Lancers a 12-7 lead just 5:05 into the contest as Sumter scored seven quick points. The Lobos came right back to tie the game at 17-17 with 11:52 left in the half but the visitors battled back to lead 24-17 at 9:13 on a threepoint field goal from senior Clayton Morgan. The hosts tied it again at 24-24 on consecutive lay-ups by senior transfer Aaron Johnson (Penn State), and went ahead 32-27 at 2:02 on a pair of free throws by Giddens. Longwood, however, scored the final six points of the period – all by sophomore Kirk Williams - including the final two baskets on dunks by the second-year player as the crowd of 10,586 was stunned and

Sumter nailed a three-pointer early in the second half for a 36-34 lead at 19:20, and the contest was tied at 39-39 with 17:59 remaining on a three-pointer from senior Husein Pistoljevic. Sumter's lay-up at 16:00 had the Lancers within one at 43-42 but seven unanswered points made it a 50-42 cushion for New Mexico. A lay-up from Morgan closed the margin to 56-49 with 9:21 left and Longwood had three scoring opportunities to close the gap even further but could not convert. Unfortunately, the Lobos proceeded to score 16-straight points to finally take control at 72-49 with 4:44 on the clock. Giddens and Johnson combined for 10 points during the decisive 2:52 explosion before each team emptied their respective benches at 4:19.

Sumter scored a team-high 16 points to lead Longwood, while Williams added 13 points (6-9 FG) and five rebounds off the bench. Morgan finished with 11 points, six rebounds, and a career-high five assists for the Lancers. LU shot 41% (23-56) from the field, including 33% (7-21) on three-pointers, and 54% (7-13) at the free throw line.

Giddens scored a game-high 25 points (9-13 FG), adding five assists and three steals to lead New Mexico; clearly the most talented player on the floor. Johnson finished with a double-double of 14 points and 11 rebounds for the Lobos. UNM shot 53% (28-53) from the field, including 56% (18-32) in the second half, 43% (9-21) on three-pointers, and 82% (14-17) at the line.

### Game 13, December 19, 2006 USC 83 - Longwood 53 Los Angeles, California

Longwood dropped an 83-53 road decision at the University of Southern California in the second-round of the 2006 Findlay Toyota/Las Vegas Classic at the Galen Center in Los Angeles. The Lancers (3-10) were led by senior Maurice Sumter with a team-high 15 points, while the Trojans (9-2) were led by Nick Young and Lodrick Stewart with 17 points each.

Longwood fell behind 6-0 during the first 1:56 before closing to within 14-11 with 13:41 remaining in the first half. USC extended the advantage to 24-13 at 6:57 but a pair of free throws from senior Clayton Morgan had the Lancers within 26-17 late in the first half (4:31). The Trojans, however, ran off 10 unanswered points to lead 36-17 at 2:13, and finished the half on an 18-6 run to take control and lead comfortably, 44-23, at the intermission.

USC shot a torrid 73% (19-26) from the field during the opening 20 minutes while outscoring Longwood 30-12 in the paint. The bigger and more athletic Trojans extended their lead in the second half, leading by as many as 34 points (66-32, 11:03), and closed the contest with a 10-5 run over the final 2:47 to secure the 30-point home triumph. USC finished with a 42-20 edge on points in the paint, and a 29-17 advantage in bench points.

Sumter finished with a team-high 15 points to lead Longwood, the only Lancer to reach double-figure scoring, adding two steals and a block. Morgan just missed a double-double with nine points and eight rebounds, while junior Lamar Barrett added nine points and six rebounds. LU shot 29% (20-68) from the field, including 26% (7-27) on three-point field goals, and 55% (6-11) at the free throw line. The Lancers did force 23 turnovers by the hosts that were converted into 16 points.

Young and Stewart each scored 17 points to lead USC, while Taj Gibson had a double-double of 10 points and 10 rebounds. The Trojans shot 57% (32-56) from the field, including 50% (4-8) on three-pointers, and 71% (15-21) at the line. USC also out-rebounded the Lancers 45-30, and tallied 20 points off of 16 turnovers by the visitors.

### Game 14, December 22, 2006 Longwood 73 - Charleston Southern 67 Las Vegas, Nevada

Longwood made 12-14 free throws over the final 4:10 en route to a 73-67 victory past Charleston Southern University during the 2006 Findlay Toyota/Las Vegas Classic at the Orleans Arena in Las Vegas, Nevada. The Lancers (4-10) stopped a seven-game losing streak with the neutral-site triumph, led by seniors Clayton Morgan and Maurice Sumter with 20 points and 19 points, respectively. The Buccaneers (5-7) were led by Donnell Covington with 31 points.

Longwood trailed early as Charleston Southern scored the first four points of the contest before three consecutive three-point field goals, including two by Sumter, pushed the Lancers in front 9-6 at 16:23. Longwood led the rest of the first half, taking its largest lead at 29-21 with 6:46 left before halftime on a basket and two free throws by Sumter. Covington kept the Buccaneers close in the opening half with 16 points, though the Lancers led 37-32 at the intermission as Sumter (13) and Morgan (10) combined for 23 first-half points.

Charleston Southern started fast in the second half, outscoring Longwood 15-6 to forge ahead 47-43 with 14:17 remaining. The Buccaneers still led 54-51 at 10:24 before the Lancers tightened their defensive pressure and did not allow a CSU field goal for the next 9:05 while taking a 65-59 advantage. During that stretch, the Buccaneers only managed three free throws as Longwood took control with its 14-5 run. The Lancers secured the outcome with 8-10 free throws over the final 1:17, including 6-6 by junior Brandon Giles. Covington added eight late points over the final 1:03 to provide for the final six-point margin.

Morgan finished with 20 points, adding eight rebounds before fouling out with 2:12 left, to lead Longwood. Sumter added 19 points, six rebounds, and three steals for the Lancers, while sophomore Kirk Williams contributed 12 points and eight rebounds off the bench. Giles had eight points and a career-high nine assists. LU shot 41% (24-59) from the field, including 29% (5-17) on three-pointers, and 80% (20-25) at the free throw line. The Lancers also outrebounded CSU 38-36, and had a season-low of just 10 turnovers in the contest.

Covington finished with 31 points, adding three assists, to lead Charleston Southern, while Dwayne Jackson grabbed nine rebounds for the Buccaneers. CSU shot 46% (25-54) from the field, including 47% (7-15) on three-pointers, and only 42% (10-24) at the line.

### Game 15, December 23, 2006 Longwood 87 - Kennesaw State 85 OT Las Vegas, Nevada

Longwood rallied from a late seven-point deficit in regulation to force overtime en route to an 87-85 victory past Kennesaw State University in the fifth-place game of the 2006 Findlay Toyota/Las Vegas Classic at the Orleans Arena in Las Vegas. The Lancers (5-10) won their second-straight game as senior Clayton Morgan scored a career-high 32 points, including the game-tying basket to force the extra period at the end of regulation. The Owls (3-9) were led by Ronell Wooten with 25 points.

Longwood trailed Kennesaw State 68-61 with 2:24 left in regulation before closing with a 12-5 run to tie the game at 73-73 after 40 minutes. Sophomore Kirk Williams made a three-point field goal from the top of the key at 0:10.8 to bring the Lancers within 72-71. After 1-2 free throws by the Owls (73-71, 0:10.2), Morgan got the ball on the left wing and put up a running 15-foot jumper that fell through the net at the final buzzer to force the extra five-minute period. Morgan scored six points down the stretch while senior Maurice Sumter also added an important basket with 22-seconds remaining (71-68).

Longwood junior Brandon Giles took over in the OT with 10 points, making a three-pointer, jumper, and three free throws in the first 3:13 as the Lancers led 83-75 with 1:47 remaining. Giles added two more free throws with 43-seconds left, making 5-5 at the line in the extra period. Kennesaw State made it close again with 10 points over the final 1:28, though missing a potential game-winning three-point attempt at the final buzzer. The closely-played contest had the Lancers leading 31-30 at the intermission before the Owls outscored Longwood 43-42 in the second half.

Morgan scored a career-high and game-high 32 points to lead Longwood, making 13-19 shots from the field (1-1 3FG) and 5-5 at the free throw line. He just missed a double-double with nine rebounds in 38 minutes while earning All-Tournament Team honors. Williams did get a double-double with 16 points and 10 rebounds for the Lancers who had five players reach double-figure scoring: Sumter (13), Giles (12), and senior Husein Pistoljevic (12). Sumter also had six assists and five rebounds, while Giles added seven assists to his effort (5-5 FT). LU shot 48% (32-67) from the field, including 47% (8-17) on three-pointers, and 71% (15-21) at the line.

Wooten led four double-figure scorers for Kennesaw State with his 25 points, adding eight rebounds. Others for the Owls included Shaun Stegall with a double-double of 16 points and 15 rebounds, Golden Ingle with 16 points, and Brent Ragsdale with 15 points. KSU shot 41% (29-70) from the field, including 30% (7-23) on three-pointers, and 74% (20-27) at the line.

Longwood finished 2-0 in Las Vegas for fifthplace in the eight-team tournament.

### Game 16, December 30, 2006 Longwood 81 - American 79 OT Farmville, Virginia

Longwood took an exciting 81-79 overtime victory past visiting American in Willett Hall, its third-straight win. Senior Husein Pistoljevic put the Lancers (6-10) ahead for good with his fourth three-point field goal at 1:03 in OT; finishing with 12 points while making 4-5 from three-point territory. The hard-fought home triumph also avenged a 60-49 loss to the Eagles (7-6) earlier this month on December 4 in Washington, D.C..

Longwood and American battled back-and-forth throughout with eight ties and four lead-changes, deadlocked at 68-68 after regulation. In the extra period, the Eagles led 76-72 with 2:52 remaining before eight unanswered points gave the Lancers an 80-76 advantage with 14-seconds remaining. Pistoljevic's fourth three-pointer at 1:03 had the hosts ahead 77-76, and two free throws by senior Maurice Sumter made it 80-76 at 0:14. An AU three-pointer at 0:04 made it 80-79, but Sumter added 1-2 free throws with three-seconds left as the Eagles missed a potential game-winning three-point attempt at the buzzer.

Longwood had opened with the first eight points of the contest, leading 8-0 at 16:57 as Pistoljevic buried two early three-pointers. Following a timeout, American closed to within 10-9 at 14:38 as Derrick Mercer scored six points and Andre Ingram added a three-pointer. The Lancers, however, increased the margin to 17-9 just 1:19 later as junior Lamar Barrett nailed a three-pointer before consecutive lay-ups from sophomore Kirk Williams. Longwood still led 28-23 at 8:03 before the Eagles took advantage of a 14-2 run to lead 37-30 at 2:41 as Ingram scored seven quick points. The Lancers scored the last six points of the period to close to within 39-38 at the intermission.

Longwood continued its momentum in the second half, capping a 17-2 run with two more three-pointers from Barrett to lead 49-41 with 17:22 remaining. American closed again and led 54-53 at 12:05 as Brayden Billbe scored four-straight points. The closely-played game was tied three times down the stretch (56-56, 10:55; 59-59, 9:23; 63-63, 7:30) before the Eagles took a 66-63 lead at 1:54 on a free throw from Ingram, and the visitors led 68-65 at 1:11 on two free throws by Arvyda Eitutavicius. The Lancers closed to within 68-67 on two free throws by senior Clayton Morgan with 58-seconds left in regulation, and Morgan tied it at 68-68 with another free throw at 0:24. American had three potential scoring opportunities in the lane during the final five-seconds but Sumter blocked the first attempt and Morgan blocked the final attempt at the buzzer to send the game to OT.

Sumter and Morgan each finished with team-highs of 16 points each to lead Longwood as Sumter added eight rebounds, three steals, and two blocks and Morgan contributed four rebounds and two blocks (career-high) as well. Barrett had a season-high 15 points (3-4 3FG), while Pistoljevic added the 12 points (4-5 3FG) for the Lancers. Junior Brandon Giles added nine points, six assists, and four steals. LU shot 46% (29-63) from the field, including a season-high 59% (10-17) on three-point field goals, and 68% (13-19) at the free throw line.

Ingram finished with a game-high 21 points to lead American, while Eitutavicius added 19 points off the bench. Brian Gilmore had 11 points off the bench as well for the Eagles, while Mercer contributed 10 points and nine assists. AU shot 41% (31-76) from the field, including 39% (9-23) on three-pointers, and 80% (8-10) at the line.

### Game 17, January 2, 2007 Providence 107 - Longwood 69 Providence, Rhode Island

Longwood trailed just 41-31 at halftime before falling 107-69 at Providence College of the BIG EAST Conference at the Dunkin' Donuts Center in Rhode Island. The Lancers (6-11) were led by senior Maurice Sumter with 16 points, while the host Friars (10-3) were led by Jonathan Kale (6-8, 250) with a game-high 18 points and Herbert Hill (6-10, 240) with a double-double of 17 points and 13 rebounds.

Providence scored the first seven points of the contest before Longwood tallied five quick points to close to within 7-5 at 16:18. A lay-up from sophomore Kirk Williams had the Lancers within 13-10 at 12:43, but an 18-3 run by the Friars made it 31-13 with 8:31 left before the break. Longwood made its own run, though, and closed to within 36-27 at 2:57 as Sumter scored 10 points during the 14-5 outburst. It was a 10-point margin at the intermission as Providence led 41-31 after shooting 52% (16-31) from the field during the opening 20 minutes.

Longwood climbed to within seven points at 43-36 early in the second half with 18:43 remaining as senior Husein Pistoljevic made a three-point field goal. Providence led 45-36 at 18:10 before the Lancer bench was assessed a technical foul at 17:29. The hosts made 1-2 free throws that ignited a 20-4 run for a 65-40 lead with 12:53 left and the game was over for all intents and purposes. The remainder of the contest witnessed 19 combined fouls whistled and 28 combined free throws attempted by the two teams to help provide for the final margin.

Sumter finished with a team-high 16 points to lead Longwood, adding six rebounds, three steals, and three blocks. Williams added 12 points and five rebounds off the bench for the Lancers before fouling out with 5:13 remaining, while freshman Billy Robinson Jr. contributed 11 points (3-4 3FG) off the bench in 12 minutes. LU shot 36% (22-62) from the field, including 44% (8-18) on three-point field goals, and 68% (17-25) at the free throw line.

Kale led six double-figure scorers for Providence with his game-high 18 points off the bench, adding eight rebounds. Hill had the double-double of 17 points and a game-high 13 rebounds for the Friars, followed by Geoff McDermott (14), Dwain Williams (14), Weyinmi Efejuku (13), and Jamal Barney (13). PC shot 58% (37-64) from the field, including an even-better 64% (21-33) in the second half, 39% (7-18) on three-pointers, and 74% (26-35) at the line. Overall, the two teams were whistled for 46 fouls while combining to shoot 60 free throws – 41 attempted during the final 20 minutes of the contest.

### Game 18, January 6, 2007 Yale 74 - Longwood 62 New Haven, Connecticut

Longwood dropped a 74-62 road decision at Yale in Connecticut. The Lancers (6-12) were led by senior Maurice Sumter with 13 points, while the host Bulldogs (4-9) were led by Eric Flato and Caleb Holmes with 14 points each.

Longwood led early at 7-5 just 2:01 into the contest on a jumper from Sumter. It was the last lead by the Lancers, however, as Yale took advantage of a 10-0 run to lead 15-7 at 13:33 as Ross Morin scored six-straight points during the stretch. Longwood closed to within 15-12 with 12:45 left in the period before the Bulldogs put together a 17-6 run to lead 32-18 at 4:22. It was the largest lead of the game for the hosts who led 37-25 at the intermission.

Longwood played much more aggressively in the second half and pulled to within 44-37 with 13:31 remaining as senior Clayton Morgan scored six quick points. Unfortunately, the opening minutes of the second half also witnessed an ankle injury to sophomore Kirk Williams at 18:42, and the second-year standout did not return after scoring eight points in 12 minutes before the injury.

Longwood continued to battle, though, and was within six points at 51-45 with 9:06 on the clock as Sumter scored another six quick points. On the next Yale possession, the decisive and key play of the game took place when Matt Kyle was allowed an offensive tip-dunk that appeared to be an offensive basket interference. After the put-back dunk, a technical foul was called on the Lancer bench which resulted in two free throws and a 55-45 lead for the Bulldogs with 8:44 left to play. Longwood could get no closer than eight points the rest of the way as the hosts connected on two big three-point field goals and made 7-10 free throws over the final 7:54.

Sumter finished with 13 points, adding three steals to lead Longwood. Morgan added 12 points and seven rebounds, and junior Lamar Barrett contributed 11 points, five rebounds, and four assists for the Lancers. As mentioned, Williams had eight points before the injury, and junior Brandon Giles added seven points and six assists. LU shot 42% (22-52) from the field, including 20% (2-10) on three-pointers, and 67% (16-24) at the free throw line.

Flato and Caleb Holmes each scored 14 points to lead Yale, while Morin added 11 points and 14 rebounds. Nick Holmes, the twin brother of Caleb, finished with 11 points off the bench for the Bulldogs. YU shot 43% (27-63) from the field, including 27% (6-22) on three-pointers, and 52% (14-27) at the line.

### Game 19, January 10, 2007 NJIT 59 - Longwood 55 Newark, New Jersey

Longwood dropped a a disappointing 59-55 road decision at the New Jersey Institute of Technology in Newark, New Jersey. The Lancers (6-13) were led by senior Maurice Sumter with a game-high 25 points, while the Highlanders (3-13) were led by Clayton Barker with 13 points while stopping a 13-game losing streak

Longwood led 3-0 early as senior Husein Pistoljevic knocked-down a three-point field goal at 19:22 for the only lead of the contest. NJIT responded with its own three-pointer at 18:48 en route to a 19-6 run to lead 19-9 with 11:35 left before the break. The Highlanders took their largest lead of the first half at 29-18 with 4:24 left until halftime, and a buzzer-beating three-pointer gave the hosts a 32-23 lead at the intermission.

NJIT extended its advantage to 38-25 early in the second half at 17:37 before Longwood rallied with a 9-2 run to close to within 40-34 with 12:06 remaining as Sumter scored four points and junior Brandon Giles buried a three-pointer. The Highlanders, however, scored eight unanswered points for their biggest lead of the contest at 48-34 with 9:05 left to play. The Lancers, though, battled back with an 11-3 run to climb within 51-45 at 3:14. An offensive rebound basket and ensuing free throw by the hosts made it 54-45 at 2:00 as the visitors could get no closer than the final margin of 59-55.

Sumter finished with a game-high 25 points to lead Longwood, adding six rebounds, a career-high four blocks, two assists, and one steal -- clearly the best player on the floor -- but just did not get much help as the only visitor in double-figures. Giles contributed nine points, five rebounds, and a game-high seven assists for the Lancers, while Pistoljevic had six points. LU shot 35% (20-58) from the field, including 27% (6-22) on three-pointers, and 69% (9-13) at the free throw line.

Barker finished with 13 points and five assists to lead NJIT, while Kraig Peters had 11 points and eight rebounds. Andrew Engel and Nesho Milosevic each contributed 10 points for the Highlanders. NJIT shot 38% (21-56) from the field, though 50% (13-26) during the opening 20 minutes, 41% (7-17) on three-pointers, and 83% (10-12) at the line.

Longwood competed at NJIT with just eight available scholarship players in a contest reminiscent of last season's unsatisfactory road loss at Savannah State (69-70). In addition, the road-weary Lancers were playing their 14th game away from Farmville in 19 overall contests this season. After Utah Valley State on Jan. 15, Longwood will play seven of its final 11 games at home in the friendly confines of Willett Hall in Farmville where the program is averaging 1,511 this season during the three games with students on-campus.

### Game 20, January 15, 2007 Utah Valley State 80 - Longwood 52 Orem, Utah

Longwood dropped an 80-52 decision at Utah Valley State College in Orem, Utah. The Lancers (6-14) were led by seniors Clayton Morgan and Maurice Sumter with 10 points each, while the Wolverines (11-6) were led by David Heck with a game-high 20 points.

Longwood never led at UVSC as the hosts jumped out to a 14-5 lead just 4:11 into the contest as Heck scored eight quick points, including a pair of three-point field goals. The Lancers closed to within five points at 17-12 with 12:23 left in the period but were no closer for the remainder of the half. The Wolverines led by as many as 15 points in the opening 20 minutes en route to a 36-23 advantage at the intermission.

Longwood was within 50-38 with 13:44 left to play after a pair of free throws by Sumter. It was as close as the visitors would get, however, as Utah Valley State scored nine unanswered points to lead 59-38 at 11:16. The Lancers reduced the margin under 20 points at 59-42 with 9:45 remaining before the Wolverines extended their lead down the stretch, outscoring the visitors 14-6 over the final 5:21 for their largest margin at the end.

Morgan and Sumter each tallied 10 points to lead Longwood as Sumter added a team-high six rebounds and two assists, and Morgan grabbed five rebounds. Junior Lamar Barrett contributed nine points and two assists for the Lancers. LU shot 35% (18-52) from the field, including 33% (4-12) on three-pointers, and 71% (12-17) at the line.

Heck finished with a game-high 20 points to lead Utah Valley State which improved to 7-1 at home, adding six assists and two blocks. Chris Bailey had 15 points for the Wolverines, followed by Matt Peterson (11) and Richard Troyer (10). UVSC shot 53% (28-53) from the field, including 64% (14-22) in the second half, 39% (7-18) on three-pointers, and 81% (17-21) at the line.

### Game 21, January 20, 2007 Savannah State 65 - Longwood 59 Farmville, Virginia

Longwood dropped a 65-59 decision to visiting Savannah State University in Willett Hall. The Tigers (8-14) led from start to finish as Javon Randolph scored a game-high 24 points off the bench. The host Lancers (6-15) were led by senior Clayton Morgan with 18 points.

Savannah State scored the first six points of the game as Longwood did not score until 3:44 into the contest (6-2, 16:16). The Lancers closed to within 12-10 at 8:43 on a pair of free throws by freshman Kevin Swecker. The Tigers extended their lead again to 20-14 at 6:05 on a jumper from Joshua Obiajunwa before six-straight points by the hosts tied the contest at 20-20 with 3:54 left before halftime as Morgan scored four points inside. Randolph made a late three-pointer and added a last-second layup to give Savannah State a 29-26 lead at the intermission.

Longwood closed to within 29-28 at 17:09 as Morgan scored again inside before the Tigers took advantage of a 16-4 run to lead 45-32 with 10:53 remaining. The Lancers battled back to 49-40 at 6:23 on a jumper from junior Lamar Barrett but Savannah State scored five unanswered points for its largest lead at 54-40 with 4:57 left. Longwood had one final run at the visitors, this a 19-9 outburst to bring the hosts within 63-59 at 0:54 as senior Maurice Sumter tallied eight quick points -- beginning and ending the run with old-fashioned three-point plays near the basket. Joseph Flegler made a pair of free throws for the Tigers at 0:39 to close-out the scoring.

Morgan finished with 18 points to lead Longwood, including 12 points in the first half, adding five rebounds. Sumter added 16 points, nine rebounds, four assists, four steals, and two blocks while playing all 40 minutes. Barrett had 10 points, seven rebounds, three steals, and three blocks for the Lancers. LU shot 34% (18-53) from the field, including 15% (2-13) on three-point field goals, and 78% (21-27) at the free throw line. The hosts forced 25 turnovers by the visitors but were only able to convert them into 20 points.

Randolph finished with a game-high 24 points off the bench to lead Savannah State, including 13 points in the second half, though he also had six turnovers. Obiajunwa had a double-double of 14 points and a game-high 14 rebounds along with four assists. Flegler added 10 points for the Tigers. SSU shot 41% (19-46) from the field, including 60% (6-10) on three-pointers, and 88% (21-24) at the line. The visitors out-rebounded the hosts 34-30 while forcing 21 turnovers that were converted into 21 points.

### Game 22, January 12, 2007 Hampton 80 - Longwood 59 Farmville, Virginia

Longwood dropped an 80-59 decision to visiting Hampton University in Willett Hall. The Pirates (7-11) were led by Rashad West with a game-high 21 points, while the host Lancers (6-16) were led by senior Clayton Morgan with a double-double of 16 points and 10 rebounds.

Longwood began the game on fire offensively by making eight of its first 10 shots from the floor (80%), including three, three-point field goals, to lead 22-12 just 6:06 into the contest. Senior Maurice Sumter scored five quick points, including a three-pointer, and classmate Husein Pistoljevic added back-to-back threepoint field goals as well. Unfortunately, the Lancers suddenly went cold from the floor and made just 11-43 field goal attempts (26%) for the remainder of the game. Hampton battled back to take its first lead at 31-29 with 6:08 left in the half behind a 19-7 run sparked by West's five points. The Pirates closed the period with a 12-7 advantage to lead 43-36 at the intermission as West scored 13 first-half points.

Longwood closed to within 43-38 with the first basket of the second half at 19:21 on a layup from Morgan but that was as close as it would get. Hampton's margin was between eight to 14 points for the majority of the second half, though the Lancers did pull within 10 points at 61-51 with 6:33 remaining on a free throw by Morgan. The Pirates, however, outscored the hosts 19-8 down the stretch with five layups and two dunks over the final 6:15.

Morgan finished with 16 points and 10 rebounds to lead Longwood with his second double-double of the season. He was the only double-figure scorer for the Lancers as Sumter added nine points and eight rebounds. Pistoljevic contributed eight points as did freshman Kevin Swecker. LU shot 36% (19-53) from the field, including 29% (5-17) on three-point field goals, and 73% (16-22) at the free throw line.

West finished with a game-high 21 points to lead Hampton, adding three assists. Michael Freeman also had a double-double of 16 points and a game-high 15 rebounds for the Pirates. Junior Pehoua added 12 points off the bench, and Matthew Pilgrim contributed 11 and five rebounds. HU shot 53% (29-55) from the field, including 30% (3-10) on three-pointers, and 70% (19-27) at the line.

### Game 23, January 28, 2007 Longwood 69 - High Point 64 Farmville, Virginia

Longwood outscored visiting High Point University 12-5 during the final 3:08 for a thrilling 69-64 come-from-behind victory in Willett Hall; stopping a six-game losing streak. The Lancers (7-16) were led by senior Maurice Sumter with a double-double of 18 points and 10 rebounds, and it was Sumter's steal and layup that put the hosts ahead for good at 61-59 with 2:52 remaining. The Panthers (15-7) were led by Mike Jefferson with a game-high 21 points.

"It was a total team effort as the guys did a great job getting prepared for tonight's game," said head coach Mike Gillian. "We had three great days of practice to be ready to play tonight. We felt like we were totally prepared; all that was left was to go out and play the game. The players deserve all of the credit because they proved through their commitment and preparation that we are capable of beating very good teams like High Point. The 'Lancer Lunatics' (student section) were also ready for tonight's game, and their support went a long way toward energizing the team down the stretch."

Longwood trailed 59-57 with 4:04 on the clock in a closely-played contest that witnessed six lead-changes and seven ties throughout. Senior Clayton Morgan tied the game at 59-59 with 3:08 left on a pair of free throws, and Sumter put the Lancers ahead for good at 2:52 (61-59) with his steal and layup. Sumter would add a 15-foot jumper at 1:20 that made it 63-59 before Arizona Reid (18 points, 14 rebounds) made two free throws for High Point at 1:04 (63-61). Junior Brandon Giles sank a floater in the lane with 30-seconds remaining for a 65-61 advantage, but Jefferson's fifth three-point field goal closed the margin to 65-64 at 0:24. Longwood secured the home triumph with 4-4 free throws, including two each from freshmen Kevin Swecker (0:14) and E.J. Dawson (0:05).

High Point, with an average RPI of 167 and who entered the contest with eight wins in its last nine games and standing second in the Big South Conference (6-1), led by as many as eight points in the first half at 26-18 with 4:32 left until the break as Jefferson scored 10 early points in the contest. Longwood fought back to within 29-28 with a 10-3 run that included four points each from Sumter and senior Husein Pistoljevic and finished with a steal and dunk by sophomore Kirk Williams. The Panthers got a buzzer-beater to lead 31-28 at the intermission.

Longwood again fell behind by eight points early in the second half at 40-32 with 18:00 left before battling back with a 19-8 run to take a 51-48 lead at 8:17. Morgan scored five points during the run, while Sumter and junior Lamar Barrett each scored four points. From there, the contest went back and forth with three tied and a lead-change as High Point took its final lead at 59-57 with 4:04 remaining to set the stage for the decisive final moments.

Sumter finished with 18 points and 10 rebounds for his second double-double of the season to lead Longwood, adding four assists, four steals, and two blocks. Morgan added 17 points and six rebounds for the Lancers, while Barrett and Williams each contributed eight points. LU shot 45% (29-65) from the field, including 13% (2-15) on three-point field goals, and 82% (9-11) at the free throw line, while taking great care of the basketball with a season-low seven turnovers.

Jefferson scored a game-high 21 points (5-10 3FG) to lead High Point, while Reid added his own double-double of 18 points and a game-high 14 rebounds for the Panthers. HPU shot 41% (24-58) from the field, including 39% (7-18) on three-pointers, and 60% (9-15) at the
